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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

SCD Govt College Ludhiana, a premier institution of Punjab, was established in 1920. The institution has been serving the student community and contributing to nation-building for more than hundred years now. Located in the heart of the buzzing city of Ludhiana, the college has become a byword for academic and extracurricular achievements. The college grounds with their sprawling lawns, lush green trees and flowers not only provide a calm and tranquil environment conducive to academic pursuits but they also serve as the lungs of the congested industrial city.

The illustrious alumni, the pride and strength of the college, have adorned some of the highest offices in the country. The college is named after Satish Chander Dhawan, a renowned space scientist, and its auditorium is dedicated to Sahir Ludhianvi, the legendary Urdu poet, both of being the alumni of the college. Apart from them, among the alumni are personalities like Sh. N.N. Vohra (former Governor J&K), S. Manohar S. Gill (Ex. MP & Ex. Chief Election Commissioner). The sportsmen of this college have made their mark on the global map. Col. Avtar Singh Cheema (Arjuna Awardee & Padma Shri Awardee), Olympians S. Sukhbir Singh Grewal, S. Jagdev Singh, S. Jagmohan Singh, Sh. Yashpal Sharma (famous cricketer).

The academic growth of the college during these hundred years has been phenomenal. The college offers 11 post graduate, 6 graduate courses and 5 certificate courses. With only 12 students in 1920, today the college has more than 4600 students on roll, with 109 full-time faculty members engaged in imparting quality education to them. For honing the soft skills of the students, the Finishing School is being run under RUSA Scheme (MHRD). The college has state of the art ICT facilities and highly qualified and experienced faculty. Smart classrooms, science labs, computer labs with Wi-Fi facilities provide a complete experience for college students in all respects. For the students hailing from far off places, there are separate hostels to accommodate about 150 boys and 100 girls. The institution also runs an Evening College which caters to the students who are working full time.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- 1. The 42-acre campus located in the heart of Ludhiana city offers easy accessibility to urban and rural learners. Our lush green campus with 40% forest cover is a boon to the congested industrial city .It also houses a botanical garden *Gulistan-e-Sahir* which is home to some exotic and medicinal plants .
- 2. 11 post-graduate and 6 under graduate programs affiliated to PU, Chandigarh are available. 4 six month certificate vocational courses affiliated to Jagat Guru Nanak Dev Punjab State Open University are also offered.
- 3. The college is the only institution in the region to have an evening college for employed aspirants who wish to complete/upgrade their education and can devote time in the evening only.
- 4. Finishing School is being run, free of cost for students, under RUSA (MHRD).
- 5. Highly qualified, experienced staff suited to the needs of modern times.
- 6. Due to its moderate fee structure, the college offers subsidized education to the all.Freeship program and scholarships are a boon to reserve category and economically weaker section of students.
- 7. Smart classrooms, modern science laboratories ,computer labs with Wi-Fi facilities, adequate sports facilities and decent hostel arrangements for boys and girls.
- 8. Shri Guru Arjan Dev Library of the college is fully automated using updated software Soul-2.0. The library has more than 1,07,400 books, 6300 e-journals, 2 lakh eBooks, subscription to 4 journals, 20 newspapers, and 40 magazines, 6230 books (Evening College library) and INFLIBNET e-resources.
- 9. The institution is one among selected Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) under Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), Govt. of India, for establishing Institution's Innovation Council (IIC).

- 10. The college NCC (Army & Air wings) and NSS units undertake community outreach and extension activities. The NCC/ NSS students have the honour of representing the state for the ceremonious Republic Day Parade.
- 11. Promoting eco-consciousness and use of renewable energy sources like solar panels, rainwater harvesting, paperless practices, awareness drives, plantation drives, etc. Solid waste management systems including composting, recycling, and e-waste disposal.
- 12. Notable and significant national level achievements in academics, cultural and sports fields.
- 13. Regular feedback from different stakeholders to enable participatory decision-making.
- 14. The college tie-ups with Punjab Institute of Sports and Punjab Sports Dept for training for national and international tournaments.

Institutional Weakness

- 1. There is heavy dependence on adhoc/ contractual manpower. More regular faculty is required.
- 2. The college needs government schemes for providing financial assistance to faculty for research.
- 3. Guidelines for financial help/ leaves allowed to attend seminars/ conferences at national and international level for staff are not defined.
- 4. More facilities (rooms/ washrooms/ sitting area) are needed to meet the growing number of students and their needs.

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. The institution can sign internship MoUs with big industrial houses of the city and enter into more industry-academia collaborations.
- 2. Employability networks and mentorship programmes can be elaborated by connecting more of well established alumni.
- 3. As per the guidelines of NEP college with its expertise in running so many departments and courses can offers range of multidisciplinary courses .
- 4. The college has scope for expansion of infrastructure sports and sports facilities.

5. More job-oriented and skill development courses can be initiated to improve employability.

Institutional Challenge

- 1. Lack of promotion, opportunities and increments is demotivating for the full time contractual staff and is a big impediment in tapping their full potential.
- 2. Low Teacher-student ratio adds to the load of the staff.
- 3. Training for indoor games in the absence of a Gymnasium Hall.
- 4. Being a purely Arts college arranging successful campus placements especially with high packages is not easy.
- 5. Self-Finance courses promote privatization of this subsidized education system.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated with Panjab University, Chandigarh, and as such follows the curriculum designed by the university. The college Prospectus provides information about the courses offered. Within the framework of the prescribed University Calendar, the college attempts to ensure a holistic development of its students.

Academic processes in SCD Government College such as timetable, division of workload, unitization of syllabus and other administrative tasks are prepared well in advance of the teaching sessions.

The students benefit from its well-equipped library.

Continuous evaluation is done through House examinations, class tests, and activities devised by the teachers. The Plan of Action chalked out in the Framework of Activities is implemented.

Our teachers are regularly involved in developing, assessing, and evaluating the curriculum of the affiliating University. They design the syllabus, set question papers, invigilate, and examine. They also contribute as members of academic bodies.

Ease of choice of subjects is provided to the students by introducing a wide range of electives within the standardized pattern of the university. Experiential learning, through internships, research project works, and field trips; is specifically facilitated.

Cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability are integrated into the curriculum by Panjab University, Chandigarh. SCD incorporates an empathetic approach, endeavouring to familiarize the students with the consequences of gender-based inequalities, neglect of environmental concerns, and lack of ethics inhibiting individual and societal growth. The institution organizes numerous programmes and events to sensitize students and ensure their holistic development.

The college also runs a Finishing School to enhance soft skills development which includes personality grooming, confidence building, imbibing etiquettes, proficiency in spoken English, and much more as per the requirements of the students.

Bolstering its academic credentials, the college offers four add-on Certificate Courses. These aid students' skill development and prepare them for the professional world.

At SCD, education is dialogic, and the feedback system gives it this transparency and accountability. Feedback is taken on forms, that are available on the website, from students, teachers, employers, and alumni; the data is compiled, analysed and appropriate actions are taken accordingly.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution recognizes the importance of the student-centric methodology of "experiential learning through reflection on doing." 'Hands-on-Learning' is emphasized. To ensure participative learning, activities like power point presentations, seminars, webinars, workshops on research paper writing, business plan making, conducting case studies, submission of assignments, etc., and marketing fests are organized.

NSS creates awareness of social issues through door-to-door visits by students, rallies, field visits, etc. Our students make their mark in various fields and win numerous inter-college, inter-university, and state competitions. The achievements of our students are the result of this holistic environment.

Apart from the traditional chalk-and-talk method, the institution enables the faculty with ICT infrastructure

comprising Computer labs, a smartboard-enabled conference room, LCD projector-fitted halls, smartboard-enabled classrooms, and a Wi-Fi campus for an effective teaching-learning process. The college library provides access to E-resources INFLIBNET and E-publications.

The college offers Learning Outcome-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) as per PU guidelines. The expected learning outcomes are communicated to the students through the college prospectus, which is also displayed on the college website, orientation programmes, noticeboard, and during student-teacher interactions. At the time of admission, the Counselling Cell and Students' Help Desk also apprise the applicants of what to expect from various courses. Admission to these courses is strictly according to the guidelines of Panjab University.

Attainment of the stated outcomes is evaluated through continuous assessment, mid-semester examination, and student feedback. Panjab University criteria for internal assessment are clearly communicated to the students well in advance. Any grievances are satisfactorily resolved. Additionally, the students can also drop in their suggestions, and complaints in the Suggestion Box. There is a stipulated *Dastak Hour* from 1 pm to 2 pm for the students to directly meet the principal though the principal is approachable otherwise also.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college is committed to the holistic development of its students and teachers. In the last five years, the college has organised seminars, webinars, conferences, workshops, field visits to enable them to explore themselves, acquire the necessary skills to cope with ever-changing and challenging situations, become agents of change, and thus contribute to building a better society. The NSS, NCC, RRC, different Clubs, and different academic departments organise extension activities to sensitize the students and faculty members, strengthen their bond with their rich cultural heritage and imbue a sense of social responsibility. Our students wholeheartedly participate in various government initiatives like Swachch Bharat Abhiyan, Voters' Day,

Ek Bharat Shreshta Bharat, Atma Nirbhar Bharat Abhiyan, Poshan Maah, Pre RDC & Republic Day Camps, and Combined Annual Training Camps. Yoga Workshops, Workshops on personal safety, cyber safety, and women's health, among others are also organised. Social enrichment and outreach activities include the welfare of underprivileged children and the aged, Blood Donation Camps, Cleanliness & Tree Plantation Drives, and Cleaning the Buddha Darya (a polluted rivulet contaminated by industrial waste of the city) Industry interface, Internship programmes, on-the-job training, and projects provide invaluable learning-by-doing experiences. All our activities are documented in the college newsletter *Youthquake* and the college magazine *The Sutlej* and they are also widely published in the national and local dailies.

The college fosters the intellectual growth of its faculty by encouraging them to attend workshops, FDPs, seminars, and conferences. They are also motivated to undertake quality research and publish it in journals of national and international repute, and books.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

With an area of 42 acres, the has a formidable infrastructure that comprises of an imposing 100 years old heritage building with well-ventilated classrooms and high ceilings. It is Block A. Block B is a double storey structure with gallery classrooms on the elevated ground floor, computer labs, HEIS office, staff rooms, the MCom (Business Innovations) Department and washrooms. Block C houses the Hindi department on the ground floor and the Economics department on the first floor. The RUSA block, also called the Ambedkar block, houses the English department on the ground floor and Chemistry classes on the first floor. Block D is the Commerce Block, again a double storey structure.

Facility of pure drinking water is available throughout the camps through RO. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled with Internet access provided to departments. The college is also under CCTV surveillance.

The science laboratories are fully furnished, equipped, and entrenched as per UGC Norms; spacious and well-ventilated classrooms and Smart Classrooms with LCD projectors make teaching-learning an exciting experience. A State-of-the-art Seminar Hall and an Auditorium see a lot of extension lectures, workshops, seminars, conferences, competitions and various functions being held. The Open-Air Theatre and the expansive grounds and gardens provide students with ample opportunities to pursue their interests in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. A well-equipped Gymnasium is also available.

Shri Guru Arjan Dev Library of the college is fully automated using updated software Soul-2.0. Books can be searched online through KOHA application. There is also the facility of N-list programme where faculty and students can access all the reference material online. The double storeyed Library is equipped with a rich collection of 107296 reference books, rare books, and text books, 50 magazines and journals, 21 newspapers, apart from e-books. It is the hub of the college along with the open-air theatre, the Corner Café, and the Canteen. In addition to the central library, the departments have their own departmental libraries where the students can get the course related books. A separate library for evening college with 6230 books is also offered by the institution for Evening College.

Student Support and Progression

The institution is committed to students' academic, financial, professional, and psychological welfare through student centric financial incentives and welfare schemes.

The students are notified about various scholarships by government and non-government agencies like Dr. Ambedkar Post Matric Scholarship for SC and OBC, National Scholarship, Post Matric Scholarship for

Minorities, Inspire Award, Student Aid Fund, Sports Fund, etc. They are also provided guidance and help for applying and availing these scholarships. In addition, some academic and sports awards are instituted by private individuals, which are given to deserving students during Prize Distribution Functions.

Numerous capacity enhancement programmes are conducted for all-round holistic growth of students like extension lectures, seminars, workshops, quiz contests, training programmes, fests, and on-campus placement drives. The institution organizes various cultural, co-curricular and sports activities. Our students actively

participate in these and in those organized elsewhere and bring laurels in Youth Festivals and Inter-College Competitions and sporting events held at university, national and international levels. There has been a significant increase in the number of students clearing competitive exams-UGC, JRF, TOFEL, ETC. and pursuing higher studies in India and abroad in the past five years.

The Career Counseling and Placement Cell of the college organizes seminars with the help of various agencies and institutions to make students aware about various career opportunities in the private and public sector. The Cell also organizes various campus and off-campus drives to help students get placement

The Students' Council is entrusted with various administrative duties during academic and co-curricular activities which not only enhance their leadership qualities and life-skills but also bring a fresh perspective to the smooth functioning of things.

The institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of grievances. A Grievance Redressal Cell, an Anti-Ragging Committee, and an Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell look into issues faced by them.

This institution has a registered Alumni Association which contributes through financial, professional, and logistic support. The institution also organizes Annual Alumni Meet on the birth anniversary of one of our most illustrious alumni, legendary poet Sahir Ludhianvi.

Governance, Leadership and Management

SCD Government College is committed to an egalitarian and team-work based work culture which is made possible through decentralised, inclusive, and participative governance in order to realise the vision and mission of the institution. Governance mechanism and leadership potential is reflected from the performance of the institution in accreditation, wherein the college scored Grade A in Cycle-1 as well as Cycle-2 and exhibited quality sustenance. In a decentralised system, annual duties are delegated to different committees in the

beginning of the session that aid infrastructure management, administration, conduct of examination, cultural events etc. Annual duty list ensures convenors/members perform designated task in coordination.

Being a government institution, State Higher Education Department is the highest decision making body. The college governance, headed by the Principal, assisted by Vice Principal and college council (comprised of senior faculty), ensure smooth functioning of the college. All decisions regarding governance is carried out with the participation of the faculty in various committees such as campus committee, examination committee, cultural committee, legal committee, RUSA committee, purchase committee etc. Academic and Administrative Audit is conducted by Department of Higher Education at regular intervals.

E-governance has been implemented in administration, finance/accounts, admission and examination.

Several governmental welfare measures are applicable to the teaching and non-teaching staff such as Pension/Gratuity benefits/ LTC / Maternity/ Child Care Leave Medical benefits etc. Teaching staff is relieved from duties to attend seminars, conferences, Workshops and training Programs for their professional development and career advancement. The college also provides many infrastructure facilities like an air-conditioned staffroom, Library, Laboratory facilities for the science disciplines, ICT facilities, common room for girls etc. The institution has a systematic annual performance appraisal system to measure the competence of the faculty and to encourage them to perform better.

The finances are managed by HEIS, RUSA, PTA, government funds. Internal and external financial audits are conducted regularly.

The IQAC has significantly contributed to sustain and enhance quality in all the aspects of the institute. It holds regular meetings, analyses and uses regular feedback for quality enhancement in various areas.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college promotes an ethos of imbibing and inculcating human values, eco-consciousness, gender sensitivity, cognizance of one's constitutional rights, rich cultural heritage, social responsibilities, and many more such ethics for the holistic development of all the stakeholders of the institution, be they the faculty, the administrative and support staff or the students.

Environmental consciousness is spread amongst students through awareness campaigns, outreach activities conducted under the banner of NSS, NCC, Red Ribbon Club, Eco Club, etc., in the campus for maintaining a clean, green, and plastic-free environment. The different Departments, Cells, Clubs, and Societies of the college commemorate national/religious festivals and days of national significance. To promote unity in diversity, the college has an active 'Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat Club'. Energy efficient lights, solar power plant, rainwater harvesting, composting unit are some other efforts made by the institution. The college is proud of its lush

green and extensive grounds, the botanical garden, the 'Gulistan-e-Sahir'. The College is the recipient of 'Most Elegant Green Garden Campus' award.

Placement Cell of the college acts as an interface between the students and the recruiters. It is responsible for placement of final year students, providing internship opportunities to students of all batches.

The entire college has been made friendly to cater the needs of Divyangjan through the construction of ramps with side-support bars, availability of railings on the stair cases and separate washrooms. Scribes are provided to students who have an impairment that restricts the ability to hand-write, type or maintain the posture required for writing, or students who, as a result of an impairment, present information better in oral than written form, may require an amanuensis during examinations.

Distinctiveness in Sports is one of the best and thrust areas of the college as there are four wings of sports such as Volleyball, Basketball, Athletics, and Handball in collaboration with the Sports Authority of Punjab. Among the other remarkable best practices of the college is the Finishing School to enhance the soft skills and employability acumen of students from different streams to make them ready for the world outside.

3. Skill development:	Education and skills go hand in hand. Skill development is the process of identifying skill gaps in the youth, and plugging those gaps by offering appropriate training. The focus of skill development is on improvement of peronality, better communication and soft skills in addition to improved recruitment and career opportunities. Apart from these, skill development also helps an individual lead a healthy, happy and meaningful life. The college has always strived to offer a holistic module of education that takes care of the practical skills and talents of the students. For this, a Finishing school was set up in the college in 2016 to empower the students of final year and make them ready to step out in the world. Different modules like Personality Development, Communication Skills, Tally and Excel; Retail Management and Marketing and IT Skills are offered to the students. Guest Lectures, Workshops and Sensitisation Seminars are organised. IAS coaching classes on How to Crack Competitive Exams; UGC- NET English Classes are also organised as per the availability of teachers and requirements of students. 1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The college follows the academic calendar provided by the affiliating university (Panjab University, Chandigarh). A meeting of College Council Members/ Heads of Departments is held under the chairmanship of the college principal in the beginning of the session. The first step in this regard is drafting of the time table and planning of overall schedule, well ahead of the commencement of the session. The heads of the departments allocate classes to teachers after careful consideration of their subject expertise and experience. All the teachers take their classes according to the official time table. They are required to unitize the syllabus for better delivery of their lectures. Curriculum is divided into various segments/ units according to the number of working days available.

Each department also plans departmental activities such as extension lectures, seminars, inter class competitions, quiz contests, inter college competitions etc., from time to time to widen the horizons of the students and to keep them updated in their subject. Departmental Academic Meetings are held intermittently to review the delivery of the syllabus and to discuss the performance of the students. Coverage of departmental activities is also discussed in these meetings. The teachers provide adequate study material to the students and constantly mentor them through their problems. Shri Guru Arjan Dev library of the college has a good collection of books, journals and magazines. It is fully automated using updated software Soul-2.0. Books can be searched online through KOHA application. There is also the facility of N-list programme where faculty and students can access all the reference material online.

The college being a member of UGC-approved N-LIST Programme under INFLIBNET, the faculty and students can access a wide range of e journals and e books. The institution provides teachers with the necessary resources, such as helping them to procure the latest references on the subject, both in print and e-book form. The teachers are also given sufficient freedom to use their capacity for initiative and innovation in the way they teach. MSTs, projects, students' presentations etc. are used as part of the teaching-learning process for tracking the progress made by the students during the semester. Performance in these activities is used then to fix the internal assessment of students and records submitted to the concerned authority. All the members of staff are encouraged to suggest the changes in the syllabi so that recommendations are conveyed to the different Boards of Studies for appropriate changes in the syllabi at University level.

The college is affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh and adhers to the curriculum prescribed by the university. This curriculum is designed by an expert committee of academicians. The committee members ensure that various important issues like gender; environment and sustainability; human values like justice, equality, liberty, caste issues, rights and duties, social responsibility, child rights, minority rights etc; and professional ethics etc. find optimum representation in the curriculum.

A compulsory qualifying paper on Environment, Road Safety Education & Violence against Women/Children & Drug Abuse is part of the curriculum for all under graduate students and it is mandatory for them to clear it.

The Commerce and Management programmes include topics on the business etiquette and professionalism, fair pricing, competition and moral business practices etc.

The syllabus of Botany includes topics on applied ecology.

The syllabi of English, Hindi and Punjabi subjects of all UG classes and of PG classes of English, Hindi and Punjabi include topics dealing with human values, gender, caste, class and race equality.

The Department of Geography, Botany along with the Environment Society and the NSS units collaborate to promote green practices through workshops, field visits and plantation drives.

Apart from the courses of regular study, the college also offers to add finesse to the personality of its raw graduates through **The Finishing School** of the college which holds classes on Communication Skills/Soft Skills, Personality Development, Retail, Sale & Marketing, Information Technology, Tally &

Excel etc. The Finishing School organised **Marketing Fest** on 16th Feb, 2019 and 2nd March 2020 to showcase the marketing and entrepreneurial skills of the students.

There are specific councils, societies and clubs like the Youth Welfare Dept, NSS, NCC, Students' Council, Red Ribbon Club, Environment Society, Women Development Cell, Anti Sexual Harassment Cell, Women Safety Cell, Legal Literacy Cell etc. that make a collective effort to sensitize the students on areas of concern.

Gender equality is promoted and stereotypes are decried through lectures on women's rights and gender-based prejudices. Women's Day is celebrated with fervour every year on 8th March. Skits are organised by the theatre group of the college to spread awareness on different issues.. Extension lectures, seminars and workshops are organised by departments on pertinent topics. Various important days are celebrated and the students are sensitized towards a sense of appreciation of traditional and cultural inheritance of the nation.

The NSS unit of the college strives to establish a bond with the community at large through awareness drives and rallies on burning social issues. Some of the issues are Cleanliness and Sanitation Drive, Awareness against Stubble Burning, Plastic Free Campaign, Fit India Movement, Self-defence and Yoga classes.

The institute recognises the importance of student-centric methodology of 'experiential learning through reflection on doing'. Hands on learning is emphasised at every stage. The students are involved in a lot of activities to help grasp the concept.

The post graduate department of English stages 'Plays' to make literature come alive for its students. Department of Economics organises mock Budget -making and live streaming of budget. Every department takes students on trips and excursions, conducts workshops, seminars and group projects. Industrial visits are arranged to ensure effective learning. You tube videos are played to explain certain concepts. Participative learning is encouraged with activities like PPT presentations, Business Plan making competitions, research paper presentations, assignments and project reports submissions.

'Marketing Festival' is often organised by Finishing school .Different Innovative Stalls are set up and the 'Best Selling' stalls are awarded. Students acting as 'Businessmen' are exposed to every step of business- procuring, advertising, setting the stall / shop and selling. Students get real-time feel of the market.

Model Making Competitions are organised by Science departments and students conduct experiments in laboratories. In theoretical subjects, teachers create mind maps as a 'Guide' and allow students to expand their horizons.

Other learning methods like problem solving ,case study ,and inquiry-based are encouraged. For social involvement various awareness drives are encouraged.NSS, NCC ,Red Ribbon Club and Red Cross Society conduct door-to-door visits and rallies regarding pestering social issues. Field visits reinforces contextual learning . This fosters learning in all possible ways. Achievements of our students are the results of a holistic environment created by the staff. Our students make their mark in various fields and win numerous inter-college, inter-university, and state level and national competitions.

Apart from traditional chalk and talk method the institute enables faculty with ICT infrastructure for effective teaching learning process. The IT enabled infrastructure in the institute includes 139 computers (including laptops), 1 computer centre, 1 browsing centre, 6 computer labs, 6 LED panel fitted halls, 3 LCD projector fitted halls, 25 smart board enabled classrooms and a WIFI campus to facilitate the flow of education.

During the covid time the institute arranged a training for the faculty members regarding the usage of ICT tools . This training on *MOODLE LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM* held from 1st-5th August ,2020 was conducted by *Green Thinkerz* in collaboration with IIT Bombay. The faculty members also use power point presentations ,slides,video clips and tap all available online resources to make their

sessions more engrossing.

100% of the staff members use Whats App groups to contact the students,78.9% use zoom platform ,33.8% use google classroom ,23% of the staff members actively use PPT while 4.2% use moocs,3% use Swayam ,6% use google meet and 5% of them have their own You tube channel.

The college library has also access to E-resources *INFLIBNET*, E-publications etc. Google forms and quizzes are extensively used in the college by students and teachers for various purposes.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time bound and efficient

The college has a well structured examination branch comprising Registrar (Dean examination), Deputy registrar, Assistant Registrar and clerical staff for the smooth conduct of the internal and external examinations.

The college follows all the guidelines related to examination and internal assessment given by the Panjab University, Chandigarh from time to time, and the students are also made aware of these via student notice boards, various circulars and teachers also convey the messages through word of mouth in their

respective classes.

The college organizes an *orientation programme* on the very first day of the commencement of the new academic session in which all the new students are familiarized with the evaluation and assessment process. Internal assessment dates are also provided by the college in the proposed academic calendar prepared at the beginning of each academic session, which is uploaded on the college website.

The college follows the academic calendar of Panjab University. **Mid semester examination** is conducted once every semester, and twice annually. Students are informed about these internal examinations well in advance by the department. The students are assessed at various levels: knowledge, understanding and application. The answer sheets are evaluated by the teachers and results are prepared within stipulated time period. The evaluated answer sheets are shown to the students in class for on-the-spot discussion of their performance and student satisfaction. The teachers also discuss the paper in detail with the students and give them tips to attempt the paper in a more effective manner. Any discrepancy is resolved at this point itself. Teachers also conduct regular class tests, group discussions, and give assignments which help to assess the performance of the students and to take remedial action if and when required. Retests and supplementary examinations are also conducted.

Internal evaluation is based on guidelines given by the university. Post graduate students are evaluated for 20 marks. The internal assessment is given on the basis of regularity (attendance), class participation and performance in mid-term examination.

There is proper provision to redress the grievances of the students, their queries and problems concerned with examination. Discrepancy or grievance at the House Examination level is addressed by concerned teachers or departments . The office of the Controller of Examinations (Registrar/Dean Examination) is easily accessible to the students for the resolution of any exam-related grievance The students can also appeal to the Chief Coordinator of Examination (Principal), if not satisfied at the level of the Examination Branch. A suggestion box has also been set up in the college in which the students can put their suggestions in writing.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1

The Institution has adequate infrastructure and other facilities for,

- teaching learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc

Response:

Established in 1920, Satish Chander Dhawan Government College Ludhiana has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching and learning. Located in the centre of the city, it is one of the prime educational institutions with a sprawling 42-acre campus with parks and natural green areas, lecture theatres, classrooms, laboratories, computer labs, internet connectivity, smart class rooms, ICT enabled seminar halls and a conference room.

There are 61 classrooms including 25 Smart Classrooms with state-of-the-art teaching and learning aids like LCD projectors and internet connectivity to accommodate theory classes and 21 laboratories for carrying out the practical work. The academic blocks are classified as Block A, B, C, D, RUSA, and Administrative Blocks. Block A and the Punjabi Department (part of Block B) are part of the Heritage Building constructed in year 1920. The classrooms are airy, spacious and are equipped with proper number of desks for students, lights, and fans. There is a Conference Room (equipped with Digital-Podium and online meeting aids), an Administrative Office, Bursar Room, Main Staff Room, different departmental rooms, and two Girls Common Rooms (multipurpose halls) for students.

A Medical Aid Room, and a Quick Response Team (QRT) has also been established for emergency situations. The college regularly uses seminar halls and auditorium for conducting national and international seminars, conferences, and other functions. All the buildings in the campus are fully accessible to the persons with disabilities. Ramps and support for specially abled persons (Divyangjan) are in place throughout the campus.

During the last five years, the growth in infrastructure has been in pace with academic developments. Laboratory equipment and apparatus have been purchased. Supportive ambience is available for curricular and academic activities in the form of two seminar halls with touch panel LED display and projector and ICT facility. Sahir Auditorium has been equipped with air conditioning unit.

Gymnasium and various multipurpose play grounds cater to the health and fitness requirements. There is a well-stocked and computerised library with N-list subscription. Separate boys' and girls' hostels with hygienic mess facilities are available. Canteen, cafeteria, and tuck shop is available for students. CCTV camera surveillance, car and two-wheeler parking, separate washrooms for male and female are available for staff, students and for *Divyang* students also. Two generators with a capacity of 60kw each are available for power backup.

Solar power plant (roof top) with a total installed capacity of 165 kw has been commissioned to mark a substantial contribution as institution's responsibility towards sustainable energy generation. In order to create and enhance the infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning, a policy is framed annually according to needs of different departments.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

Guru Arjan Dev Library of the College is fully automated using updated software Soul-2.0. There is also facility of N-list programme where faculty and students can access all the reference material online. The library building has two stories, well stocked with latest books, journals, magazines, newspapers, as well as e-books and ejournals. The library has more than 1,07,400 books, 6300 e-journals, 2 lakh eBooks, subscription to 4 journals, 20 newspapers, and 40 magazines. The upper floor is devoted to reading room. The facility of e-material was used regularly during covid period from home. The library committee purchases books on regular basis. In addition to the central library, the departments have their own departmental libraries where the students can get the course related books. A separate library for evening college with 6230 books is also offered by the institution for Evening College. The institution also provides the facility of membership of the Extension Library of Panjab University Chandigarh established at Regional Centre of Panjab University Ludhiana.

The College Library serves as a resource centre to grasp knowledge and is a research hub for information dispersal. Books are set out methodically in the authorized order. Pest control has also been done. The college faculty and students are provided library enrolment and association. Online attendance of the visitors is marked through QR Code. The librarian ensures valid ID card for students to avail oneself of library services and reference books for issuing. The user is responsible for the book borrowed against

their membership. Annual stock verification is also carried out regularly including plans for periodic enhancement of reading material. The library is equipped with adequate seating capacity for staff as well as students. High bandwidth internet facility is available with a dedicated computer.

There is a separate reading area for staff, students and Divyangjan. To ensure convenience of visually impared students, textured flooring has been laid outside Library. With the wifi routers all around the campus of the institution, staff has the freedom of using digital gadgets without the worry of fading digital signals. The campus is equipped with 14 optical fibre internet connections having 100 Mbps speed. These plans are optimised with the latest ones as per the availability in the area. The institution is very concerned about deployment of adequate technology. The institution has 139 computers including 9 laptops. Out of these, 100 computers (with hardware specification of i5, i3 and core duo, Pentium dual core computers) are for the use by the students. Scanners, printers, projectors, photostat machines, networking switches, access points, routers, multimedia speakers, web cameras, barcode readers, tonners, projector screens, external storage media and online/offline UPS are also available.

The IT infrastructure and facilities are updated regularly. Continual up-gradation is done in the internet access and campus network. The LAN and wifi connections are available through central firewall (Nebero System purchased in the 2019) located in server room and the internet bandwidth is distributed throughout the entire campus. All the faculty members and students of different departments as per their requirement use this facility through firewall. The user id and password are provided by the college system administrator. The Wi-Fi access points are also installed in administrative office, Principal office, library, computer department, science department and other locations in the campus.

The college has added many new editions to its repository of licensed softwares during the last five years including Windows Preloaded and Paper Licence, MS Office, K7 Anti Viruses, Visual Studio Pro, Corel Draw, RedHat, Linux, Oracle, Windows Server and client, Adobe Director, Adobe Flash, Busy, Wings, Tally Prime, Quark. Apart from the purchased software, departments use a variety of Open-Source Packages. The college has 21 Smart Class Rooms and 2 Seminar Halls equipped with Interactive Board and Projector, Visualizers, along with LAN and Wi-Fi Compatibility.

The institution employs ICT for a wide range of activities. During Covid-19 teaching learning transaction was carried out by using online platforms like Zoom, Google Meet and Google Class Room. YouTube lectures which were prepared used for the teaching learning process. Webinars and online programmes were conducted by various departments. ICT is used for purpose like Examination, Admissions and Support Services to students.

The website of the institution is being maintained by the Computer Science Department. The information related to NAAC and IQAC is updated on the college website. The registration forms, Prospectus, Annual Reports and schedule of admission and examinations are displayed for easy reference of the stake holders. Timeline of upcoming events and the report of activities organized are also available.

Response:

Being a government institution, SCD Govt. College comes under Directorate of Higher Education, Punjab. Hierarchical setup is established from top authority to down with the levels clearly demarking the duties, responsibilities, accountability and authority at every stage. The college has an effective organizational structure which monitors and ensures the smooth functioning of the college activities (teaching, learning, testing and evaluation, administration and finance) and work to improve the institution as and when required. The IQAC of the College ensures that various strategies and plans are deployed for the smooth functioning of academic, research and cultural activities. All the staff members actively participate in the admission of students, teaching and learning activities, examination and evaluation, research and development, curriculum development, industry interaction and collaboration, human resource management and enrichment of library and maintenance of college infrastructure.

The appointments are made by Punjab Government through PPSC and Civil Services Rules are also followed by the institution. The organizational structure of SCD Government College mainly consists of the DHE (Department of Higher Education) Punjab and Principal. DHE Punjab is the highest decision-making body which is in constant touch with the Principal for smooth functioning of the College.

The Principal is assisted by the College Council, Bursar, Department Heads, Committees Incharges/Conveners and Administrative staff. The College Council oversees the smooth functioning of the departments for which meetings are held on a regular basis to discuss issues and concerns related to curricular and extra-curricular activities. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of SCD works towards realization of the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance.

Functional committees are constituted for steady development of various process like admissions, examination etc. These committees are classified as Statutory and Non-Statutory Bodies. - 4. Canteen facility is available during the working and extended hours. Separate comfortable area is provided for the staff.
- 5. Internet and free Wi-Fi facilities are also available for the staff.
- 6. Faculty staffroom is fully air-conditioned.

- 7. Departmental staff rooms have computer, printer and internet facility for research and academic purpose.
- 8. The college library has dedicated area for the faculty members. There is also provision for photocopy of reference material.
- 9. Tuck Shop stationery, and other essential goods of day-to-day requirement of the faculty, staff and students are met by the tuck shop in the campus.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The college is a government institution. The grants received from the government are utilized for the development of the college infrastructure, salaries of the staff and for the organizing academic, cultural and sports activities. The Principal and college council monitor the use of allocated funds. These funds are utilized to purchase equipments, for renovation of the campus and to organize seminars, workshops, conferences.

Administration and Finance Committees (PTA and HEIS) review the use of resources including audit and make recommendations for better handling of resources and effective mobilization of available funds. For smooth functioning of the institution various committees have been constituted by the Principal to analyses the requirements regarding different purchases. In case of any need where the financial support is required, the demand in writing is made from the concerned Department and proper procedure for purchases is adopted. Most of the purchases are done from government's GeM portal.

The financial audit is done by the Accountant General of Punjab from time to time, as per the directions given by the Punjab Government, for various funds like Panjab University Funds, Punjab Government Funds, Local Funds and Expenditures for Salaries of Regular Staff, University and College Functions, Electricity Power Consumption etc. The College Bursar is the Internal Auditor.

For Higher Education Institute Society in the College, the External Auditors are CAs for revenues in terms of admission fee and expenditure in terms of salary for its Adhoc Non-Teaching Staff, Faculty Members and purchase of apparatus and infrastructure for academic courses of BCA, BBA, M.Sc. (IT), M.Sc. Physics and Chemistry. Internal Audits are done by HEIS Bursar. Similarly for Parent Teacher Association of the college, the external audit is done by CAs for receipt of PTA Fund and for expenditure as partial salaries of guest faculty, temporary class IV employees and Lab Staff DC rates), college infrastructure, college functions and for college development. The internal auditor of PTA is the bursar.

The organizational structure of the College consists of Principal, College Council, Teaching Staff, Non-Teaching Staff and the Students. Feedback is

Book Bank:

Book bank has first time setup in evening college under the guidance of respectable Prof. Inderjit Kaur in 2018. One day book donation desk has been set up every year to collect books from old students and teachers to help needy students.

Cultural Activities:

In the cultural activities, students have won many prizes in the PU zonal and inter-zonal youth festivals. The college luddi team, vaar singing, folk dance, and histrionics won many prizes in Panjab University's zonal as well as inter-zonal youth festival college. Gurjit Singh has begged first position in bhangra and jhoomer in the youth festivals.

Sports Activities:

The college is committed to offering resourceful infrastructure for holistic and all-round development of students in sports. There is a hockey ground which has a history of hosting international matches. It has a 400-metre track having a capacity of 1500 spectators, a football ground and a volleyball court having state of the art lighting system and net enclosure which boasts of producing sportspersons of the international repute. A cricket pitch is there for organizing cricket matches/tournaments along with eight net practice pitches for practice sessions. There are four Sports Wings: Volleyball, Basketball, Athletics, and Handball. There are free hostel arrangements for sports wing players. In the session 2022-23, college students won medals in different kinds of sports such as Volleyball, Basketball, Athletics, Wrestling, Cricket, Skating, Taekwondo, Karate, Weight lifting, etc.

The college has separate hostel for boys and girls within the main campus. The hostels have 24X7 water and electricity supply. The college provide free hostel to sports students. Hygienic and good quality food is offered in the mess. Living quality of high standard is ensured by a committee of the senior teachers which controls over the proper functioning of the hostels. The College also provide sports kits, sports equipment, track suits and PTA (free) and fee concession. Sports wing provide proper healthy diet, technical coaching from expert coaches.

To provide better sports facilities, higher education department has granted Rs 10.85 lakh for LED lights in the college volleyball court. The sports centre is supported by Punjab Institute of Sports and state

sports department, and has trained nearly 100 national and international players including Arjuna Award winner IPS Sukhpal Singh Brar.

The students play in the three outdoor volleyball courts, and are being trained by a coach provided by the state sports department. The HOD of Physical Education department Prof. Kulwant Singh informed that the centre also had a weight training centre and the players trained there regularly win inter-college, inter-university and national level tournaments.
